Skittles

Every morning at assembly time, the children are given the opportunity to play in the hall. For many children this is a lovely way to start the school day. A popular game that is suitable for all age groups is Skittles. It includes elements familiar from dodge-ball, but also a requirement for quite skilful toppling over of - exactly: skittles. Your child will most likely be able to explain the game to you.

Work in small groups

After assembly, the junior group is working in smaller clusters on their literacy and numeracy program. Deirdre and Máire work together here to allow the children progressing on their own individual level and speed. The smaller groups make it possible to support the children better in their efforts. In SSP we use the Jolly Phonics program (literacy) and the Ready Set Go program (maths). These generally are well established for developing good means a understanding of language and of maths.

Chess

There is a history in SSP of the children learning to play chess. Chess is а game that involves concentration, strategy and forward thinking. It requires mathematical thinking and as such, it is a wonderful help for children in developing their maths skills. This year, Deirdre has taught the children of 1st and 2nd class the basics of the game. The children in the senior room often play with the 1st and 2nd class during buddies time to further develop their knowledge of the game. Learning here is two-sided, as one of the most impressive results of teaching others is that the teachers nurture and stabilise their knowledge themselves. Before Covid we regularly invited children from other schools to visit us and play chess with them. We hope that this will be possible in the future again.

Music Generation

For the last number of years, Cranmore Regeneration Programme has funded a music programme in SSP. It is called *Music Generation*. Last term, the children in the senior room learned to play keyboard with the help of Karl Burthom, one of the Music Generation tutors. Deirdre supported Karl and ensured that the children practised between lessons. Since January, Karl works with the junior class on a music programme. The focus will be on enjoyment of all aspects of music including, rhythm, singing and percussion.

Woodwork

We have reopened the woodwork room for guided activities. Children from first class on take turns working in pairs on individual projects. For the younger children this includes first of all getting familiar with basic tools, and yet produce something nice for themselves, or also to bring home. You may be the proud owner of a wooden snake or a smiley face made from birch-wood already. These woodwork pieces are a source of great joy for the children both in the making and when finished. Older children who have developed a certain level of mastery of tools frequently work on more demanding projects. Some of them also create their own designs, be that a wooden sword, a robot, a puppet bed, a toy town, or whatever can realistically be fabricated in the school.

Izaq 9 Cubes

The children in the senior room have started using "Izaq 9 cubes" as part of the maths curriculum. These cubes allow the children to co-operate to solve various maths problems. The children are working together in groups of three or four on their tasks. There is an Izaq 9 website that we can log onto, where many tasks and activities are given to the children using the interactive whiteboard. The activities can be challenging and the idea is that each team collaborates to complete the task.

Dodge Ball

On the yard at present, dodge-ball is a popular game. With Carmel's guidance, the children from 1st to 6th class play together most days. Children and adults agreed the rules of the game at our school meeting and it is working very well. Two of the 6th class pupils are teaching the junior and senior infants how to play dodge-ball. We try to give the children opportunities to mix with each other as it creates a trusting atmosphere in the school. The juniors look up to the

seniors and the seniors take good care of the juniors, and are wonderful role models for them.

Movie Project

During this school year Carmel's class is working on a movie project. The children started off with some brainstorming sessions about their own future (what they imagine themselves to do, or to be in twenty years time). The different characters that were imagined were then woven into a story-line. The story turned out to be a crime fiction. The older children in the class transferred the narrative of the story into a script for the movie. They created dialogues and scene settings that will be used as directions for the actors in the movie. We expect to do rehearsals soon and the recording of the movie should take place in May.

For the movie production we are still looking to find someone who owns a vintage car and would be happy to allow us using the car for some of the scenes - obviously under their supervision ③. If you know of someone who could approached in this regard, please contact Leon or Alex in Carmel's group.

Symposium Child-Centredness

All members of the school community are invited to participate in the symposium on the topic of child-centredness which will take place in Sligo School Project on Saturday, 21st of May, 2022, in the time from 11:00 - 17:00 h.

There will be three sessions in which always a guest speaker will give an introductory presentation of approx. 30 minutes, followed by an open discussion of 60 minutes.

Child-centredness is one of the principles underlying the practices in Sligo School Project. It is also a concept that informs the national curriculum. In the symposium we wish to discuss ideas, images, theories and practices in schools. The symposium provides a very informal space for dialogue and discussion between people from all backgrounds. We hope to bring together parents, friends, staff of SSP, other interested persons, and invited guest speakers for a day that combines the joy of a social gathering with the excitement of inspiring discussion.

Guest speakers:

Leah O'Toole and Thomas Walsh (on historical developments of the national curriculum in Ireland),

members of Sudbury School Sligo (on educational concepts and their reference to child-centredness), Amelia Hempel-Jorgensen (on child-centredness in relation to working class children).

Participation in the symposium is free of charge. For parents who wish to take part and want to bring their children with them we will organise child-minding on the day. Families, parents, guardians who know already that they intend to participate would help us a lot if they were to let us know, particularly if you need child-minding.

For the breaks during the symposium we are going to organise home-made food. If you know already that you will take part in the event and that you would be happy to bring some home-made food with you, please let us know. It reduces the work load of coordinating immensely.
